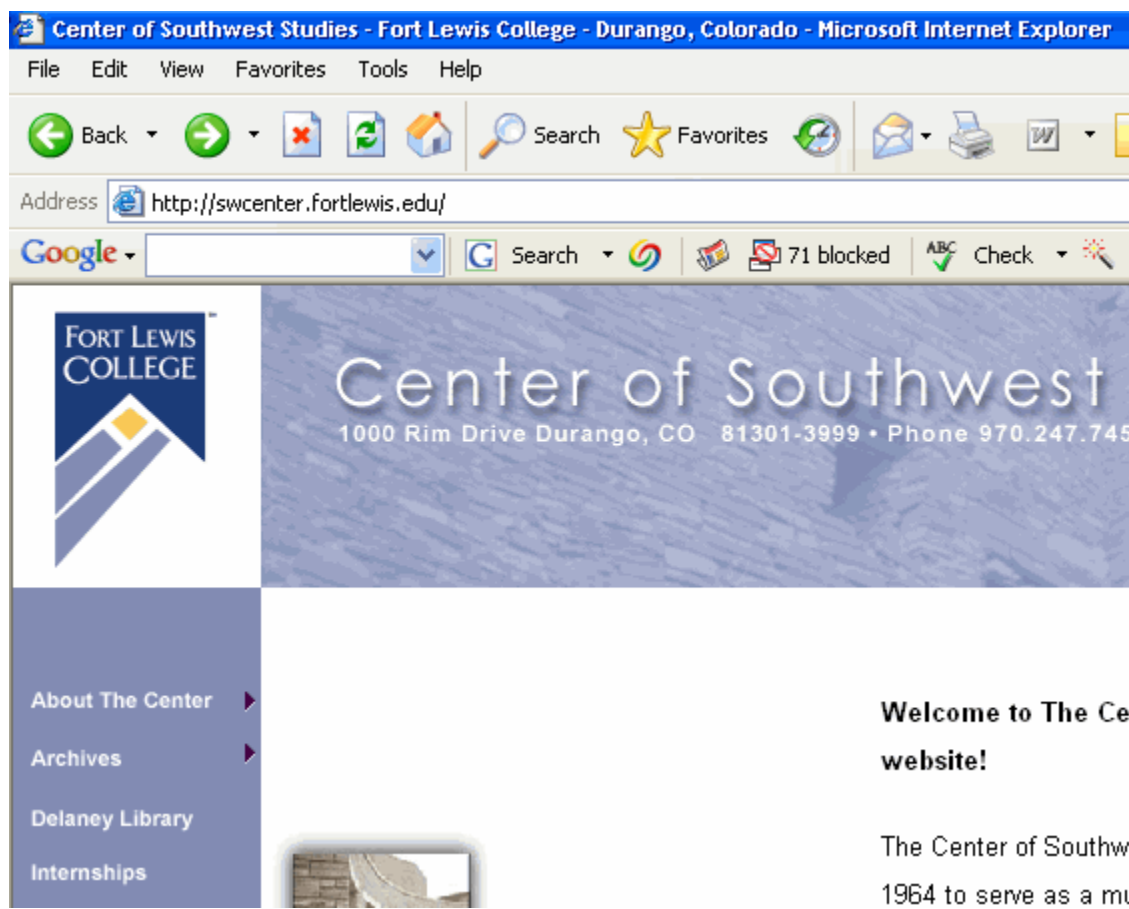

- M 191 [Andrew Gulliford papers](#). Records resulting from research conducted by Dr. Gulliford while he was preparing several historical works for publication in the 1990s, especially his book entitled *Sacred Objects and Sacred Places: Preserving Tribal Traditions*.

- I 034 [Carlos Montezuma, et al., papers on microfilm](#). An early Native American M.D., Yavapai, he was an author, a founder of the Society of American Indians, and an Indian-rights activist.

Director of Soil Conservation Service Land Management Operations among the Pueblos, 1935; Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) Superintendent of the Navajo Reservation during the New Deal under John Collier, 1936-1942; BIA Superintendent for Nevada, 1948-; and BIA Assistant Commissioner of Indian Affairs, 1961-.
- M 040 [Helen Sloan Daniels papers](#). Printed materials re: various tribal groups of the Southwest, arranged by tribal affiliation (Navajo, S. Ute, etc.) and in a general category.
- I 035 [Indian Rights Association records on microfilm](#) (United States). The IRA was a humanitarian group focused on influencing federal Indian policy and protecting Indians of the U.S., especially in the 1880s-1890s.

- M 221 [John Collier articles series, 1959-1960, in the Ward Shepard/ John Collier papers](#) (digital images). John Collier was the first U.S. Commissioner of Indian Affairs (1933-1945), and a professor of anthropology at City College of New York, writer, poet, philosopher and a political activist.
- I 032 [John Gregory Bourke diaries on microfilm](#). Documentation of Navajo, Pueblo, and Apache Indians and anthropological observations of American Indians in the western and southwestern United States.

Official manuscript administrative, judicial, civil, military, and legislative records of the Mexican Republic government in New Mexico from 1821-1846. Pertains to Spanish, Mexican, Pueblo Indian, Navajo, Apache, Genizaro, and Mestizo cultures of the region.
- M 127 [Myra Ellen Jenkins papers](#) (Southwestern U.S.; especially New Mexico). Papers accumulated by the former state historian of New Mexico. A primary focus is the land and water rights of New Mexico's Pueblo Indians.
